Sedges and Ferns

Ferns typically thrive in shady locations. Most prefer medium soil moisture and cannot tolerate dry soils. Please see "Mesic soil and shade" below.

Sedges are perennial, grass-like herbaceous plants that grow in clumps and usually, but not always, prefer moist soils. They have triangular stems and spiked inflorescences. There are hundreds of species in many sizes.
